

Why does my transfer credit look different in Banner?

In SCT Banner, Utah State University equivalent courses are displayed on your unofficial transcript rather than the courses you transferred to Utah State. Below is a guide to help you and your academic advisor interpret the various USU equivalencies that may show on your transcript if the credit was transferred to Utah State:

- The course you transferred to Utah State has a direct equivalent, that course will show on your unofficial transcript. For example:
LFSC 1010 from CEU is equivalent to BIOL 1010 at Utah State, the transcript shows:
BIOL 1010 BIOL & THE CITIZEN (BLS)
- The course transferred to Utah State has multiple equivalencies, those courses will be listed individually:
CHEM 106 from BYU-Idaho is equivalent to CHEM 1210 & CHEM 1230, you will see:
CHEM 1210 PRINCIPLES OF CHEMISTRY I
CHEM 1230 CHEMICAL PRINCIPLES LAB I
- The course transferred to Utah State does not have a direct equivalent and will be accepted as general elective credit, *but* is taught in a comparable department at Utah State:
ENGL 2445: *Shakespearean Poetry* from SUU displays as:
ENGL 2XXX* SHAKESPEAREAN POETRY
ACCT 4850: *Federal and State Tax Codes* from BYU displays as:
ACCT 4XXX* FEDERAL & STATE TAX CODES
- The course transferred to Utah State does not have a direct equivalent and will be accepted as general elective credit *and* Utah State does not have a comparable academic department:
CJ 1010: *Intro to Criminal Justice SS* from Snow College displays as:
ELEC 1XXX** CJ-INTRO CRIMINAL JUSTICE (BSS)
SSC 3010: *Student Leadership* from Westminster College displays as:
ELEC 3XXX** SSC-STUDENT LEADERSHIP

* The XXX indicates that the title that follows is the transfer course title

** The Department in which the transfer course is taught is listed before the transfer course title

The most important thing to realize is that rather than your transfer courses displaying on your transcript, you will see only the Utah State equivalent courses. If you have any questions about your transfer credit on your unofficial transcript, please contact your academic advisor.
