Overview

About This Degree

Parks and recreation involves creating and implementing recreational activities for various groups in communities. Graduates of the program seek to provide meaningful activities and programs to help improve the quality of life for those they serve.

In this program, students develop business skills, including budgeting and personnel management. They also learn about program development and how to direct and administer recreational programs, such as camps, intramurals, youth groups, and outdoor leadership programs. Additionally, students learn how to measure the success of these programs with the goal of understanding the needs of diverse populations, improving programs, and providing meaningful services for organizations and communities.

Students also gain hands-on experience through internship opportunities built into the curriculum during the junior and senior years.

Career Options

With this degree, students are qualified to provide management and programming services for city, state, and federal parks and recreation departments; community agencies (YMCA, etc.); youth-serving agencies (Boy and Girl Scouts, Boys and Girls Clubs, etc.); and commercial agencies doing the following types of work:

- Administering and directing recreational programs (camps, intramurals, and outdoor leadership programs)
- Budgeting
- Designing recreational programs
- Evaluating (conducting basic research) to measure the effectiveness of programs
- Managing personnel

Admissions Requirements

In addition to Utah State University's [admissions requirements](#), the parks and recreation program has additional requirements:

- **Freshman:** New freshmen admitted to USU in good standing qualify for admission to the parks and recreation major.
- **Transfer Students:** Transfer students from other institutions and other USU majors need a 2.5 total GPA for admission to the parks and recreation major.

Labs, Centers, Research

With the second oldest [undergraduate research](#) program in the nation, USU offers students a wide range of opportunities to gain hands-on research experience. The [Undergraduate Research and Creative Opportunities](#) program allows students to apply for grants and receive funding. USU's [Honors Program](#) prepares students for excellent graduate programs by helping them build relationships with professors, participate in research projects, take smaller, more intensive classes, and develop leadership skills.

Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Building: The HPER building contains approximately 50,000 square feet of programming space. It houses the HPER Department and USU Campus Recreation advising and faculty offices, a number of classrooms, three gymnasiums, one dance studio, two swimming pools, a 1,500-square-foot weight room, six racquetball courts, and male and female locker rooms. Adjacent to the HPER building is a grass outdoor facility used for activity classes, club sports, and intramurals. Eight outdoor tennis courts complete the HPER complex.

Outdoor Recreation Program: The goal of the Outdoor Recreation Program is to enable USU community members to experience the physical and mental benefits of safe, fun outdoor recreation by providing them with excellent equipment, instruction, and resources. It provides equipment rentals, skills training, and planned group activities for anyone interested.
