About This Degree

The program in audiology prepares doctoral-level professionals to evaluate and manage individuals who are suspected or have been identified as having differences associated with hearing. The AuD is a four-year, post-baccalaureate residency program, the first of its kind in the Intermountain West and Pacific states. The AuD enables graduates to enter the field at a professional level and begin a rewarding career of service in this evolving allied healthcare discipline. Graduates are qualified audiologists who find careers in hospitals, clinics, schools, and more.

The audiology program is accredited by the Council on Academic Accreditation of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

Admissions Requirements

Applicants must have a bachelor's degree in communicative disorders or the equivalent undergraduate prerequisite courses, either from USU or another accredited program.

Application Requirements:

- Complete the [online application](#)
- Pay the \$55 application fee
- Score at or above the 40th percentile on the GRE or MAT (MAT only accepted upon approval by the department)
- Have a 3.0 or higher GPA on your last 60 semester or 90 quarter credits
- Provide transcripts of all college/university credits
- Provide three contacts for letters of recommendation

Labs, Centers, Research

Audiology Clinic: The Audiology Clinic provides diagnostic audiological evaluations for infants, children, and adults for USU staff, students, and members of surrounding communities. Evaluations vary from simple pure tone screening to a complete battery of diagnostic hearing tests. All diagnostic services are supervised by certified university staff members and are conducted by advanced students in the training program.

Center for Persons with Disabilities: The CPD is a nationally recognized research center that joins the expertise of researchers and faculty with community partners to address the most difficult challenges facing persons with disabilities and their families. Research addresses issues that cross fields ranging from biomedicine to education. In clinical experiences, learners join teams of professionals, family members, and individuals with disabilities to deliver services and supports.
