Overview

About This Degree

Students who major in elementary education (K-6) become licensed to teach grades K-6. This degree option was created in response to a high demand for more qualified kindergarten teachers throughout the state, and it provides a more streamlined process for students to become qualified to teach a wider range of grades.

All students in the program gain a broad knowledge of subjects in elementary education and then choose an emphasis to study more thoroughly. Students may choose more than one emphasis, but only one is required.

Utah State's program in elementary education is unique in that students have the opportunity to work with children starting their first year in the program rather than waiting until their junior year, which is typical at other universities. By the time students graduate, they will have spent more than 600 hours in eight different practicum experiences.

The Emma Eccles Jones College of Education and Human Services is ranked 5th in the nation among colleges of education in external research dollars.

Students receive a **BS** by completing all required courses in the major. To receive a **BA**, students must also gain proficiency in one or more foreign languages.

Career Options

Students who major in elementary education are qualified to be licensed to teach grades K-8 and highly qualified to teach K-6, based on federal standards for "No Child Left Behind."

Admissions Requirements

In addition to Utah State University's [admissions requirements](#), the elementary education program has additional requirements:

- **Freshmen:** New freshmen admitted to USU in good standing qualify for admission to the pre-major.
- **Transfer Students:** Transfer students from other institutions and students transferring from other USU majors need a 2.75 total GPA for admission to this major.
- **Teacher Education Program Requirements:** In order to become an elementary education K-6 major, students must be accepted into the teacher education program, which includes the following:
 - Completion of 30 semester credits with a minimum GPA of 2.75
 - Complete certain core courses (see department for more information)
 - Complete a speech and hearing test
 - Pass the Teacher Education Writing Exam
 - Pass a criminal background check (this should be done one semester before applying)
 - Pass the Praxis II elementary education content knowledge exam (this should be done at least one semester prior to applying)
 - Participate in a group interview and earn a minimum score of three
