

Admission Requirements For This Major

1. New freshmen accepted in good standing by the University may apply for admission to the History Department.
2. Students transferring from another institution or another major will be admitted if they have a minimum 2.5 GPA in history courses and an overall minimum GPA of 2.5.
3. A minimum 2.75 grade point average is required for entry into the teacher education program. Students must receive a grade of C or better in all courses to be counted toward the History Teaching emphasis or the teaching minor.

The Program

The Department of History offers a flexible, reading- and writing-intensive program to accomplish the following objectives:

1. To train undergraduates to research, analyze, synthesize, and communicate reasonable conclusions about the past by using the historical method.
2. To teach cultural literacy and provide the knowledge necessary for informed decision-making by citizens of Utah, the United States, and the world.
3. To provide students with crucial work skills in research, analysis, communication, and collaboration, while enriching their lives.
4. To contribute to the liberal arts curriculum of the University through general education and general interest courses, the history major, the history teaching emphasis, minors in history and classics, and the interdisciplinary programs of folklore, religious studies, American studies, and British and commonwealth studies.

The requirements for this major, along with University and University Studies requirements, are summarized in this program sheet. Students are encouraged to keep this program guide and to use it in recording progress toward the completion of their degree requirements. Students are also urged to study this requirement sheet and the *General Catalog* frequently and to visit with their advisors on a regular basis about progress toward the completion of their degrees.

Career Opportunities

For hundreds of years, history has been the preferred education for those interested in improving their lives and serving their communities. A core discipline of the liberal arts, history prepares students to work with people in all sorts of endeavors. Alumni of the Department of History manage multi-national companies and local businesses, serve in many public capacities (including Congress), run charitable organizations, work in military intelligence, train as medical doctors, and teach history.

Many history students are preparing themselves to teach in public schools and at colleges and universities, while others will find employment as “applied” historians. Some graduates qualify to be curators and archivists in museums and libraries, working to classify and preserve materials, setting up exhibits, and working with researchers. Others work as preservation historians for historical societies, collecting data and working to preserve historic sites.

Historians also work as editors and researchers in publishing or may provide advice on sets and clothing in the making of films. Some historians work as biographers, while others collect information on family lineage.

History is an excellent undergraduate major for students wishing to work in international relations, journalism, or management. Students preparing for law school, advanced business degrees, and management or sales training also benefit from a history degree. History is a good major for those preparing to work in the growing information management field. Career opportunities for history majors continue to expand and diversify with each passing year.

Breadth Requirements (18-20 credits)

Select at least one approved course from each of the following six categories: **American Institutions (BAI)**, **Creative Arts (BCA)**, **Humanities (BHU)**, **Life Sciences (BLS)**, **Physical Sciences (BPS)**, and **Social Sciences (BSS)**. At least two of the six breadth courses must be University Studies courses with a **USU prefix** (excluding USU 1000, 1010, 1100, 3330, 4900, and 6900). (CLEP or AP credit may be used.) One course chosen from HIST 1060, 1100, 1110, 1500, or 1510 will fulfill the Humanities requirement for students in the History major.

Exploration Requirement (3-4 credits)

Choose an additional class from one of the following General Education categories: QL, BAI, BCA, BHU, BLS, BPS, or BSS. Since several courses having a BHU designation are listed as required or elective courses for the History major, one of these courses will fulfill the Humanities requirement, while another will meet the Exploration requirement.

Depth Education Requirements

Communications Intensive (CI) (2 courses)

Two courses having a CI designation, selected from the list of electives, will meet this requirement. For students in the History major, HIST 4990 (the required Capstone Course) may be used for one of these courses.

Quantitative Intensive (QI) (1 course)

One course having QI designation (such as PHYS 2210 or 2220) will meet this requirement.

Depth Course Requirements (4 credits minimum, including 2 credits minimum completed in each of two courses)

Complete at least 2 credits in approved 3000-level or above courses from each of the following two categories: **Life and Physical Sciences (DSC)** and **Social Sciences (DSS)**.

Transfer Students

The History Department accepts all history courses taught by institutions within the Utah System of Higher Education. AP Credit

The History Department *does not* accept AP credit for use toward its degrees. However, if a student has passed an AP exam with a score of 3 or better, the equivalent lower-division course will be waived, and the student can complete the equivalent number of credits in an upper-division course. This waiver *does not* apply to students enrolled in the History Teaching Emphasis.

Departmental Requirements

A grade of *C* or better is required in any history course used to meet the requirements for a major, minor, teaching emphasis, or teaching minor in history, or for a classics minor. A 2.5 grade point average is required for the courses used to meet these requirements. A 2.75 grade point average is required for entry into the teacher education program.

Since history can be classified in *both* the humanities *and* the social sciences, majors may receive *either* a Bachelor of Arts (BA) *or* a Bachelor of Science (BS) degree. However, because history primarily involves the study of written documents, the department encourages students to choose the BA, which requires proficiency in a foreign language.

Bachelor of Arts Language Track

The Bachelor of Arts (BA) degree in history requires a minimum proficiency in a foreign language. This proficiency may be established in one of the following ways:

1. 16 credits in a single language;
2. Documentation of a proficiency level of "intermediate low" or better through an examination administered by the USU Department of Languages, Philosophy, and Speech Communication; or
3. Completion of any upper-division foreign language course constituting a third-year course of study with a grade of *C* or better.

Students should note that demonstration of proficiency in American Sign Language will *not* meet the foreign language requirement for the BA degree in history.

Bachelor of Science Mathematics and Science Track

For those interested in a BS degree, a significant amount of coursework in the College of Science is required. These courses must contribute significantly to an understanding of science and the scientific method. Therefore, students must complete 8 credits in one of the following course pairs: BIOL 1610/1620, CHEM 1210/1220, PHYS 2110/2120, **or** PHYS 2210/2220. Students *cannot* receive a BS in history unless they successfully complete one of these course pairs with grades of *C-* or better. Students must also complete at least 6 additional credits in math or science, 3 of which are required to be in *either* statistics (e.g. STAT 2000, 2300, or 3000) *or* social science statistics (e.g., PSY 2800, POLS 3000, or SOC 3120). The other 3 science credits may be chosen from any 2000-, 3000-, or 4000-level math or science course having one of the following prefixes: BIOL, CHEM, CS, GEO, MATH, STAT, or PHYS. For these 3 science credits only, students may petition the department head of the History Department to substitute a course from outside the College of Science, if it has a demonstrable scientific or technical focus (e.g., ADVS 3020, ETE 3200, PEP 4200, WATS 3000). In all instances, a grade of *C-* or better is required for any math or science course to be applied toward a BS degree.

Students who minor in a science field will fulfill the BS requirement through their minor.

Note: Since the study of history requires an understanding of many fields of human endeavor, students majoring in history must select a minor. Historians are encouraged to take electives in fields that will broaden their knowledge of the world and are closely allied to history, such as religious studies, literature, economics, geography, anthropology, political science, sociology, classics, philosophy, or foreign language.

Students wishing to undertake graduate work should pursue the BA degree. During their senior year, they should take the graduate record exam (GRE).

Students should complete their remaining 21 credits by taking 3000- and 4000-level history courses. (For a list of these courses, see section E under *History Major Requirements*.) A minimum of two courses must be taken from each of the following areas: U. S. history, European history, and world history. No more than 3 credits of HIST 4930 can be applied to the history teaching emphasis.

All students in the history teaching emphasis must also have a teaching minor in an area for which teaching licensure can be granted.

G. Secondary Teacher Education Program (STEP) (35 credits)

To graduate in the History Teaching Emphasis, students must fulfill the requirements of the 35-credit STEP prescribed by the School of Teacher Education and Leadership (TEAL).
