HOW TO BECOME A USU STUDENT

STEP I:

Get Admitted

- I. Complete an application for Undergraduate Admission and Scholarship which are available online at www.usu.edu/admissions
- II. Submit an official transcript, along with ACT or SAT test scores. Contact the high school/college from which you graduated and request an official transcript. It may be mailed directly to the admission office in Logan or given to you in a sealed envelope for you to mail to the admissions office. If you took the ACT or SAT in high school your score will be on the high school transcript. If you have not taken the ACT and have been out of high school less than seven years you will need to take the ACT to complete your application. If you are over the age of 25 the ACT can be waived. Applicants who have not graduated from high school may substitute results of the GED.
- III. Pay a non-refundable application fee of \$40 by the appropriate date. Returning students pay a \$20 application fee.

Deadlines for new freshman:

Fall Semester – April 1 Spring Semester – November 1 Summer Semester – April 1

Deadlines for transfer students or returning students:

Fall Semester – July 1 Spring Semester – November 1 Summer Semester – April 1

Students who miss the above deadlines are still welcome to apply, but there will be a \$15.00 late fee.

STEP II:

Talk to you advisor

Academic advising is a relationship in which an advisor (a faculty advisor or professional advisor) helps a student select, plan and complete his/her academic goals without unnecessary delays and expense. You will want to work closely with your advisor to plan your program of study so that you will take the required courses in their proper sequence to meet the graduation requirements of your major and the University.

How can you make the most of an advising relationship?

1. Develop your social, academic and career goals and examine how these goals will affect your life.
2. Become familiar with Career Exploration Services and the other resources at USU and discuss your long range goals, career opportunities and the selection of a major or minor with career counselors, faculty, your academic advisor and the other resource people.
3. Keep current on academic policies, procedures and requirements by reviewing the current catalog, schedule of classes and major requirement sheets.
4. Know basic University, college and departmental graduation requirements of a chosen major or minor well enough to plan your own progress toward completion of these requirements.
5. Accept responsibility for your decisions.
6. Maintain personal copies of a tentative degree plan, progress reports, and general educational evaluations until an official graduation application is processed.
7. Know your advisor. (For information and assistance, contact your academic department, your college academic service center or the University Academic Service Center in TSC 302.)
8. Seek help from your advisor when needed.
9. See that any academic records from other universities are transferred and received by the Admissions Office for evaluation.
10. Become familiar with the information in the front section of the USU Catalog and the first section of the semester's schedule of classes.
11. Study carefully the current semester schedule of classes, which is available prior to each registration period.
12. Read and follow the instructions on the Course Request Form.
13. Take the initiative to contact your advisor during office hours. It may take more than one attempt before you connect.
14. Prepare a list of questions or concerns before each meeting with your advisor. Have a tentative written schedule prepared if you are registering.

15. Become familiar with student service offices and student organizations on campus.
16. Ask questions! If you don't understand a policy or procedure, ask questions until you understand.
17. Make decisions. Your advisor will present you with options.
18. Know the academic calendar in the front section of the current semester schedule of classes. Don't miss deadlines. Know when to register and drop or add classes. Set up appointments with your advisor well in advance of these deadlines.
19. Read your progress report (unofficial transcript), including your scholastic standing.
20. Learn the degree requirements using the catalog and major requirement sheet.
21. Cooperate with your advisor regarding class scheduling and degree plan changes.
22. Study this information so you can make the most of your appointments with your advisor.

Academic Renewal

Undergraduate students who have been admitted to Utah State University after an interruption in their collegiate education of five or more years may petition to have certain credits removed from the calculation of GPA needed for credit. The renewal procedure allows the student's academic records to be reviewed for the purpose of eliminating from grade point average computation all grades of D+ or below that were entered on the academic transcript *five or more calendar years* prior to admission, *including transfer credit*. Petition forms are available in the Office of the Registrar. A \$25 processing fee will be assessed.

Guidelines:

1. Academic renewal *does not* apply to graduate students or to students pursuing a second undergraduate degree.
2. Academic renewal may be applied *only once* and is *irreversible*.
3. An absence of *five or more years* must have elapsed between admission and the last enrollment at an institution of higher education. (Note: Students must be currently enrolled at USU to apply for academic renewal).
4. After admission, but before application for renewal, the student must have completed at least one of the following at Utah State University:
(a) 10 semester credits with at least a 3.00 GPA; (b) 20 semester credits with at least a 2.75 GPA; (c) 30 semester credits with at least a 2.50 GPA
5. Academic renewal applies only to courses having grades of D+, D or F and taken prior to readmission. All such courses will remain unaltered on the transcript with appropriate notation added to the transcript to indicate academic renewal. Course with a grade of C- (or P) or better will be carried forward.
6. Students may apply for this renewal after they have met the guidelines listed above. They are strongly encouraged to meet with their academic advisor prior to submitting their request.
7. Academic renewal will be effective as of the date of the admission following the *minimum five-year absence*.

AND THIS TOO!

Associate of Science in General Studies

An Associate of Science (A.S.) degree in general studies is offered through Regional Campuses and Distance Education (RCDE). Though awarded through RCDE, the A.S. degree is available to student attending main campus as well.

The requirements for an Associate of Science degree include the completion of:

- **60 total credit hours** (at least 20 must be completed at USU)
- **University Studies requirements** (Competency and Breadth Requirements)
- **Specialization credits** (It is highly recommended that students utilize their remaining credits in an area of specialization in order to ease the transition to a Bachelor degree program and/or better prepare for employment.)
- **Total Institution GPA of at least 2.0**
- **Graduation application process** (includes a fee)

An Associate of Science degree is ideal for students who:

- Have a lot of old (quarter) credits they want to wrap up
- Plan to transfer to another institution of higher education
- Want only a “two-year” degree
- Have been attending school for a long time and need the sense of accomplishment obtaining an Associate of Science degree can provide.

STEP III:

How to Apply for Financial Aid

Because of complex federal requirements, it can take up to three months to process an accurate application. Errors will delay your award even more, so complete forms carefully. Campus-based funds are awarded according to need to the earliest applicants. Once these limited funds have been awarded, applicants will be considered for Pell Grants and Safford Loans only.

1. Apply for admission to USU. **You cannot be awarded financial aid until you are admitted.**
2. Complete your US Income Tax form 1040, 1040A or 1040EZ as soon after January 1st as possible. You will use some of your income tax figures to fill out the federal financial aid application.
3. Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) on the web. Go to <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov> or www.usu.edu/finaid.
4. The Student Aid Report (SAR) will be mailed to you 3-6 weeks after your financial aid application is submitted. Keep this for your records. However, if there are errors you will be asked to make the corrections and return the form. The Financial Aid Office will only need to see your SAR if you **did not** list Utah State University as your choice of schools on the FAFSA.
5. Some students will be asked to complete the USU Supplemental Application and Verification (VAPP). The VAPP, along with a signed copy of your income tax form (Form 1040, 1040A, or 1040EZ only), should be mailed to the Financial Aid Office or Logan campus. Your campus SAR will tell you if you have to submit the VAPP.
6. A Financial Aid Award Contract will be mailed to you from USU once your application is processed and awarding has taken place. It will tell you what you have been awarded, and will give you instruction on how to go on-line to accept your financial award.

If you will be receiving a loan there are additional steps.

The University reserves the Right to review and cancel financial aid awards at any time due to an awardees change of residency, marital or academic status, or because of failure to observe reasonable standards of citizenship. Repayment may be required if over-awarding occurs. Continuing USU students must apply each year. Financial aid is not automatically renewed.

Pell Grant:	Free money from the Federal Government that you do not have to pay back.

Loans:	You DO have to pay these back, but at a reasonable interest rate. About loans: If you are awarded a student loan, additional processing is needed before funds will be available.

Scholarship Checklist for Successful Funding

Find Scholarships

- Apply for USU Scholarships
- Search scholarship books
- Search the internet
- Ask your contacts (Work, Student Services, Reentry Student Services, Major)

Make Sure You Qualify

- Note key words in description of scholarship
- Determine that you meet all minimum requirements

Get Recommendations

- Choose references who know you in an Academic or Professional context
- Ask two or three (2-3) weeks in advance
- Provide all necessary information to person providing recommendation
 - Title/description of scholarship
 - Correct name, title, and address of donor
 - Two copies of any applicable forms
 - Provide, in writing, a list of relevant accomplishments, skills, biographical information
 - Ensure letter gets to proper destination: return letter to you? Use a sealed envelope? Send directly to scholarship committee?
 - Provide a reminder a few days before the agreed upon deadline
 - Send a thank-you note

Complete Application

- Make an extra copy first (to avoid mistakes on the original)
- Type, if possible. Otherwise, PRINT legibly (no cursive)
- Completely answer each question. Use extra pages if necessary
- Gather supporting documentation. (tax information, resume, transcripts, ect)

Write Letter or Essay (if required)

- Know who is on the selection committee (peers or professionals)
- Anticipate the type of recipient the donor is seeking (single parent, scholar, volunteer, ect)
- Stress the characteristics/ attributes you have that fit the criteria of the scholarship

STEP IV:

Register for classes

You may register in person or online at www.usu.edu/registrar/. If you choose to registrar in person you must bring a: Photo identification, and your A# (Access User ID). They are required to process any request. For all records transactions, please complete the appropriate form(s) by following instructions provided prior to your visit to our office. If help is needed, our staff will assist with the needed assistance.

Visit Reentry/ Non-traditional Student Center

Services available

REENTRY SOAR: Is held twice each semester to assist returning students to become acquainted with various campus and community resources; receive assistance with advising and registration, and to help integrate them into college life. Please call SOAR at 435-797-0283 for current dates or to get authorized to take SOAR online.

MENTORING PARTNERSHIP: is sponsored as a mentoring partnership in which USU reentry students that are juniors, seniors or graduate students will be available to mentor new reentry students.

PINNACLE: Is a national honor society for reentry students who demonstrate leadership, persistence and future promise. These students have been involved in three campus and /or community activities. Maintain high ethical standards and have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 for undergraduates, and a 3.4 for graduate students. Applications for Pinnacle will be available on our web site January 12, 2009 and due back February 23, 2009.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE: Is provided by offering scholarships to undergraduate or graduate reentry women and men who have a gap in their education. Tuition waivers are also available for reentry women and men students. Information on financial aid from USU, as well as community, state, and national sources, are available on our website. It would be to your benefit to fill out a FAFSA (Federal Student Aid form. This information is utilized by the center as well as financial aid to determine your level of need. You can go to the website at www.fafsa.ed.gov and fill out the free application.

CHILD CARE STIPENDS: Are available for reentry students who need extra child care coverage during midterms and finals.

COUPON SWAP: Is to help reentry students with the cost of food expenses. With food prices so high and incomes limited, we like to assist students with their food costs as much as possible. If you have coupons that you will not use but could benefit another student you can bring them into our center and we will clip them and categorize them for your fellow students.

REENTRY WORKSHOPS: These are designed specifically for the non-traditional students . Come and join us in the TSC the fourth Wednesday of each month at noon for a brown bag lunch and a great workshop. The Reentry Student Center will provide drinks and dessert. For a complete list of our workshops check our web site at www.usu.edu/reentrystudent.

LIBRARY: The center offers books, videos, and articles that may be of assistance with classes or of interest to the returning student. These are available for checkout through the center.

STUDY ROOM/LOUNGE: The RSC has a study area/lounge for our students use. The lounge has a microwave, refrigerator, television as well as a computer and printer. A sofa and comfortable chairs are provided if you just need to come in and relax.

SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

(Administered by Women's Resource Center)

This successful program has been in operation since the Women's Center opened in 1974. The program helps students realize their educational goals by providing financial assistance. Reentry students, particularly women, often encounter obstacles as they make the transitions involved in returning to school. The awards have not only monetary value, but also represent a source of support and encouragement.

Funds for awards are made available through individual donations and tuition waivers from the University. Please read the scholarship criteria carefully to determine the specific requirements for each scholarship. Scholarships are different. Some are open to men and women, some do not require reentry status and some have specific GPA or major requirements. It is to your advantage to carefully consider each set of requirements.

Eligibility and Criteria

Scholarships are available to:

- Reentry women and men undergraduate or graduate who have a gap of five years or more at some point in their education
- Men & Women seeking their first bachelor's degree
- Traditional women and men who meet the requirements below

Requirements:

- Applicants must be admitted to Utah State University before applying.
- Applicants must have a 2.5 GPA, 3.0 GPA for Graduate Students
- Awards must be used at Utah State University or one of its extensions.
- If you have previously attended a college or a university, an unofficial transcript is required. If you have previously attended USU, an unofficial transcript is required. Applications will not be processed transcripts.
- A recommendation form should be completed by someone who can address the issues of your motivation and success as a reentry student. A faculty member or an advisor is strongly recommended if you have not been a student in the past year, a recommendation from an employer or supervisor is acceptable. Recommendations from family or personal friends will not be accepted.

There are requirements for scholarships recipients which include but are not limited to thank you letters, volunteer hours, etc.

Scholarship Application Checklist

Put It All Together

- Set a deadline for yourself about two weeks prior to the actual deadline
- If application is brief, (one page), consider including a cover letter
- Include everything requested, NOTHING more.
 - Completed application
 - Letters of recommendation
 - Letter or essay
 - Supporting documentation
 - Ensure that EVERYTHING has been proofread
 - Make a copy for yourself, and start a resource file for scholarships
 - Have the envelope weighed before mailing to ensure correct postage

Keep Going!

- Get feedback for scholarship-sponsoring organization or other programs.
- Look for more scholarships. Adapt materials already collected to new opportunities.

When writing your paper

Do these things	Avoid these things
Say thank you for the opportunity to apply	Negative statements (whining)
Include the date	Generalized statements with no support
Use the correct name and address of the donor. Verify the spelling	Too many pages
Name the specific scholarship	Handwritten
Identify why you would be a great recipient	Forgotten signatures
State your major and plans for the future	Poor grammar
Provide a clear and accurate picture of your circumstances.... Just facts	Poor punctuation
	Misspelled words

FIVE SCHOLARSHIP RECOMMENDATION LETTER SUGGESTIONS

- Be brief. You'll have the chance to sell yourself in your application.
- Request all necessary materials early enough to allow time to prepare a strong application packet.
- Clearly state when you need your recommendation(s) sent back or given back to you. Allow a minimum of three (3) weeks notice, leaving ample time to write the letter.
- Provide all contact information where you can be reached. Provide a self addressed stamped envelope, if applicable.
- If you are awarded a scholarship, thank the provider as well as anyone who wrote letters of recommendation on your behalf.
