

Notice to Parents and Students Regarding Age of Majority Rights

Students become adults when they turn 18. The rights of parents and their students change at that point, unless a court finds that an adult student cannot manage his or her own affairs and appoints a guardian. If that occurs, then the adult student is again considered to be a minor and the guardian is able to make decision on behalf of the adult student. Unless a court has appointed a guardian, the school-related rights of parents and their adult students are as follows:

Rights of Adult Students:

- The residence of an adult student is where the student chooses to live.
- An adult student can approve his or her own educational placement and Individualized Educational Program (IEP) without help from parents, family, or special advocates.
- An adult student can allow parents, family, or special advocates to help if he/she desires.

Rights of Parents of Adult Students:

- If an adult student is still dependent upon parents for support, the parents may continue to see the student's school records without the student's permission.
- If a parent believes that an adult student is not capable of handling his or her own affairs in whole or in part, the parent may ask a court to appoint a guardian. A guardianship may apply to all aspects of the student's life or may be limited to certain things, such as educational programs or money management.

Responsibilities of the School:

- Unless a court has appointed a guardian for an adult student, the school must assume that the student is capable of managing his or her affairs.
